A Word from Pr. Joe

As we approach Lent this year, one of the things that has been on my mind is “how do we bring worship into our homes and into our lives?” Back when we were a more agricultural society, there were times and seasons of the year that marked not only changes in the natural order, but also in our church life. Ember days were days of fasting that marked the different seasons of the year. There were Rogation days, in which the faithful participated in prayer, fasting, and processions, asking God’s blessing and protection over the crops. And of course, various saints’ days had their own traditions. Many of these traditions took place in the home. An example of this is our Epiphany house blessing with the chalking of the doors. We have revived the Slavic tradition of the Oplatki at Christmas. We also bring our baby Jesus figures from our crèches to church for a blessing on Christmas Eve. Many homes in the Scandinavian tradition still follow the St. Lucia day tradition of children bringing breakfast to parents.

All of these were meant to inform and strengthen the faith, and bring worship out of the sanctuary and into the home. Granted, there were many that became more superstition than faith-filled, and in some ways the Reformation era poured the baby out with the bathwater with many of them. The Age of Enlightenment eroded those traditions (and the liturgical worship in Anglican and Lutheran churches) even further. Different traditions did, however, survive, and are now able to look back and reconsider their places in our lives.

Some examples: one of my colleagues bakes “soul cakes” on All Saints’/All Souls Day (she’s a Lutheran pastor); another bakes Lammas bread on the first of August. (Lammas, from Old English meaning “loaf-mass” as a blessing on the first-fruits of the harvest.) Even something as silly as having roast goose on the feast of St. Martin marks the time and puts the faith in front of us, and brings it into our very homes.

On Sunday, February 4th, I will offer the blessing of the throats after each service. This is an old tradition, based on the feast of St. Blaise (died 4th century). He is considered the patron of those who suffer throat ailments, as he reportedly prayed for the healing of a child who was choking, and the child recovered. Perhaps in this time of Covid, and even now when we are dealing with rising cases of Covid, the flu, and RSV, it might not be a bad idea to have our throats blessed? It may sound silly and superstitious, but aren’t we called to ask God for blessing and healing? We can confidently come to God with any concern.

I will be considering ways to bring our worship into our homes this year, and I will be sure to share what I find. We will look at the history and the traditions, and how we can bring Christ into our homes in our daily lives.

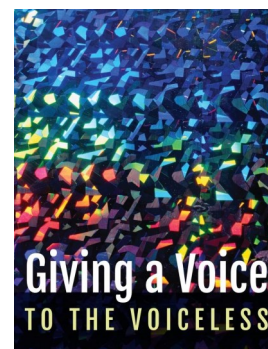


When you make quilts and kits for neighbors in need, you are God's hands sharing love across the world.

**STYRO-STATION ORIENTATION, WEDNESDAY, 2/21
3:00PM – 4:00 AND 5:30PM – 6:30**

To keep up with the amount of foam being recycled, we need MORE VOLUNTEERS to prepare foam for densifying. **In this orientation you'll learn:** How the Styro-Station is organized (Yes, it really IS organized!); To sort foam items into “ready to recycle” bags and “needs washing” boxes; The different procedures for food service, packaging, egg cartons and cups; Hands on experience with making Bag Bundles; and the configuration for washing and drying foam in the kitchen. Debunked Myth: “Foam to wash is covered with mold, bugs, leftover beans and rice, etc.” *These things are removed as health hazards during the pre-sort. None of these things make it to the kitchen for washing!*

The ULCSC foam recycling program is blessed with year around support from within, Churches Caring for Creation, and community individuals.

At January's Council meeting, the Green Team was asked to come up with a “dream” plan for how they see the foam recycling program growing in the future.

We are clearly attracting attention from commercial sources, communities in central Oklahoma, ecumenical OKC churches, which will only add to the amount of foam to densify. Other Norman churches have “signature programs” that define them: McFarlin's Food Pantry; First Baptist's Men's Bicycle ministry; First Presbyterian's Thrift Store and Coffee shop; and others. **Has foam recycling become ULCSC's signature program?** According to Council, it fits the description. Thank you for the vote of confidence, Council!

From the community, we receive assistance from the Cleveland County Master Gardeners who send 8 bags of foam to the Styro-Station each month; Norman North Environmental Club whose volunteers come a couple of times a month to clean and sort foam (Thanks ULCSC's Sierra Hill!); ABLE Community Based Services whose clients are making bag bundles and washing foam every Wednesday afternoon; and all those locals who recycle foam with us. It's estimated that at least 10 people a day come to the Styro-Station and leave foam!

Applying Bible Principles

One of the most familiar of all Bible passages is 1 Corinthians 13, which is known by many as the “Love Chapter.” Many people — Christians and non-Christians alike — have committed part or all of these thirteen wonderful verses to memory. But most people probably do not realize that one of the greatest truths concerning giving is taught in this passage.

The Apostle Paul, writing under the direct and divine inspiration of the Holy Spirit, said, “If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.” In other words, according to this verse, our giving is to be motivated by love. If it is not, then it has absolutely no value to us.

The question here is not how much we give, or how frequently we give, or the manner in which we give, but **why** we give. And it is based on the principle taught so clearly in Romans 5:8, “But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners, Christ died for us.” When we were nothing but sinners, Christ died for us. When we had nothing but the refuse of sin in our lives, Christ died for us. When we were “strangers” to God’s promises, Christ died for us. Long before we could ever love Him, He provided convincing evidence of His love for us by dying for us on Calvary. And that’s why “We love because he first loved us” (1 John 4:19).

One of the ways in which we demonstrate our love for God is through giving. If we give out of a sense of obligation or because “the church needs the money” or because we feel we have to give, we miss the point of 1 Corinthians 13:3. We also miss the blessing that comes from giving out of a heart motivated by our love for the Lord. When we give because of that motivation, our giving provides a tangible expression of our love for Him as we give in response to His love and grace.

As the offering plate passes by you next Sunday at church, you might want to pray this prayer of thanksgiving and commitment: “Lord, thank you for loving me before I could love you. Thank you for demonstrating your love by dying on Calvary for me. And thank you for the privilege of giving to you today as I worship you through this expression of my love for you.”
