A Word from Pr. Joe

Seasons Change

We are now in the season of Lent. It is a time of preparation, of learning how to be disciples of Jesus, and to walk with Jesus even to the cross. The word 'Lent' is an old Germanic word meaning "spring," and could also refer to the lengthening of days as the sunlight increases in the northern hemisphere. The observance of Lent is ancient, and is followed by both the Eastern and Western Churches, including Orthodox, Catholic, Lutheran, Anglican, and most mainline Protestants. It is characterized often by fasting, especially in the Eastern Church. It is a forty day period, and this has its roots in the Old Testament, with Moses fasting for forty days and forty nights before receiving the Law (Exodus 34.28) or Elijah fasting for the same period of time as he went up to Mt. Horeb (1 Kings 19.8-9). And of course, Jesus himself fasted and faced temptation as he prepared for his ministry. (Mt. 4. 1-3, Mk. 1. 12-13, Lk. 4. 1-13) The early Church, certainly by the 4th Century, had established this time of fasting for 40 days before Easter. This period of forty days before Easter follows in that tradition, and prepares us to celebrate the Resurrection.

The Church does not only sanctify time by seasons. The Church also sanctifies time by particular Sundays, as well as commemorations and saints' days. Our Church calendar is the first thing after the Introduction in our hymnal, Evangelical Lutheran Worship. Pages 13-59 contain the calendar and propers for each Sunday and principal commemoration. Marking time as God's people goes far back into our history, even to the very beginning of Creation, as God declared each day and its creation as "good." Our Jewish forebears sanctified time with set times to pray, to offer sacrifice, to have days of commemoration, and days of fasting.

We modern Lutherans, being heirs of these prayers, also sanctify the day itself. Although we tend to look only at Sunday celebrations, there are more times and ways to pray that join us with the whole church. (Personal prayer at any time is how most of us spend most of our prayer time, myself included.) Monastic communities, following the tradition of the Jewish Temple prayer hours, continued, and continue, to pray at set times per day. Even Lutheran monastics follow this ancient prayer cycle, and pray without ceasing. For example, here is the horarium, or prayer times, of St. Augustine's House, a Lutheran monastery in Michigan:

- 5.10am Vigils
- 6.00am Lauds
- 8.15am Terce
- 8.30am Eucharist
- 12.00pm Sext
- 2.30pm None
- 6.00pm Vespers
- 8.30pm Compline That's a lot of prayer! Yet everything that is done throughout the day is truly surrounded by prayer, by Scripture, by hymns and songs.

While that is not something most of us have time for, there are ways

we can still participate in parts of it, setting aside times for prayer and Scripture. In our own hymnal (and in our previous hymnals) the Prayer Offices, as they are called, are present for our use. Matins (a combined Vigils and Lauds), Vespers (Evening Prayer), and Compline (Night Prayer) are right in our own hymnals. The smaller offices, such as Terce, Sext, and None,

are usually filled in by Responsive Prayer (ELW, pp. 328-331). Although the first three are set to music, they can be simply read aloud as they are prayed. Scripture readings for each day are found starting on page 1121. All 150 psalms are also included in our hymnal.

I write all of this as an encouragement to pray

without ceasing. We have such a great treasury of readings, psalms, and hymnody. We have beautiful gifts from the Tradition at our fingertips in our hymnal to surround our lives and our days with prayer. As we move forward on our Lenten journey through this springtime, may our days and nights be filled with prayer.






Altar Guild in Need of New Members





Voices for the Voiceless Update

An update of the family whose daughter sold pen and ink cards to aid in getting them out of Afghanistan: through various means, they have been evacuated to Albania! They are now waiting to get paperwork completed to get to Norman, a family reunification! The father had had a heart attack around the time the Taliban took over, which prevented him and seven others from leaving.

Refugee Sunday is March 10. That Sunday and March 17, envelopes will be available for donations or you can donate at www.nc4rs.org. Your help is greatly appreciated.

There is a plan in the works to change sewing locations from First Presbyterian to University Lutheran. The Afghan women were learning how to sew garments for their families, working on learning English and having time to socialize. More information will be given as plans are put in place.

Other Afghan news: a baby is due in early March. Major dental work continues. A woman is close to getting her driver's license. Most families are working on getting into Section 8 housing.

Applying Bible Principles

A few years ago, the world was thrown into confusion and chaos. The Middle East had oil, and the rest of the world wanted that oil. This was a crisis situation. The perception was that we were running out of oil. In reality, that wasn't the situation at all. We were not running out of oil. As Larry O'Nan described it, "The core problem was a matter of imbalance, greed, and selfishness. Competition had created an environment where we thought we needed to get something before someone else got it."

Just as perception created an illusion that the world was running out of oil, perception has created an illusion when it comes to giving to the work of the Lord and to His ministry at University Lutheran Church. The perception is that our financial resources are insufficient to enable us to give. Some of us think that we simply cannot afford to give.

But that's not the situation at all. Even poverty is not a reason for not giving to the Lord. The Christians in Macedonia were very poor. As 2 Corinthians 8:2 describes them, they were in "extreme poverty." Yet, even in that situation, they were full of joy and gave as much as they were able — and more. How could they do that?

The reason they gave abundantly, eagerly and willingly out of their "extreme poverty" was that they "gave themselves first to the Lord." That's the secret of giving that honors God. When we give ourselves to Him wholeheartedly, without reservation, then our financial resources will follow.

During the reign of Oliver Cromwell, the government ran out of silver with which to make coins. Cromwell sent his men everywhere to see if they could find more of the precious metal. They returned to report that the only silver they could find was in the statues of the saints which were on display in various cathedrals. "Good," replied Cromwell. "We will melt down the saints and put them into circulation."

As you consider the offering which will be received next Sunday at University Lutheran Church, and as you consider the resources God has placed at your disposal, will you be "melted down" for His service and His glory? Like the Macedonian Christians, will you — regardless of your financial situation — first give yourself to the Lord and then allow your financial resources to follow?


